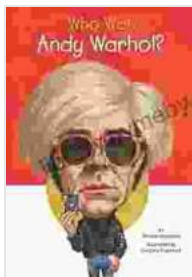


Who Was Andy Warhol?

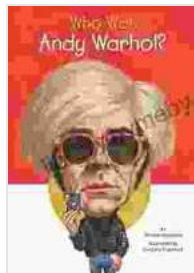
